

Philmont Scout Reservation is a national camping area, owned and operated by the Boy Scouts of America. Philmont is

large, comprising 137,493 acres or about 215 square miles of rugged mountain wilderness in the Sangre de Cristo (Blood of Christ) range of the Rockies. 32 staffed camps and 50 unstaffed camps are operated by the ranch. Philmont has high mountains which dominate rough terrain with an elevation ranging from 6,500 to 12.441 feet.

JLT is evidence that a Scout has the knowledge, experience, and confidence to carry out the responsibilities of his leadership position. The Junior Leader Training Conference is the most advanced Scout Leadership program offered by the Mecklenburg County Council. This seven-day training course is open to Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venture Scouts.

Each participant will be prepared for more effective Troop or Team leadership through the leadership skills he acquires and the sharing of his experience with his home unit. More important, he will have experienced personal growth in a memorable setting that will benefit him far beyond his Scouting years.

JLT focuses on eleven subjects called the Eleven Skills of Leadership... the core concepts of planning, organizing, and achieving success as a team leader. Every participant will gain basic understanding and practice in the application of these skills that will serve them in Scouting and throughout life.



The eleven skills are: Knowing & Using The Resources of The Group Understanding Needs & Characteristics of The Group Communicating Planning Controlling the Group Evaluating
Representing the Group
Sharing Leadership
Effective Teaching
Counseling
Setting the Example

White Water Rafting Time !!!

OK guys. It's that time again! Time to reprise the whitewater trip to West Virginia.

Last year, we managed to soak everybody at least once. If we didn't dump the raft, we got them in the water. Our guides didn't fail us and the bus managed to make it around that parked car without driving off the cliff...

Doesn't that make you want to go again? Now is your chance. Those of you who were only 11 last year will get to float the whole river this year. The class IV and V rapids are all on the lower half of the river.

The younger scouts (under 12) will get to float the easier rapids, have

lunch on the river and swim at the watering hole under the bridge.

We're going to leave the church the evening of August 13. We'll camp two nights, float all day Saturday, check out the bridge on Sunday and head home Sunday afternoon on the 15th. The cost is lower this year, only \$85 per person. That'll buy us gas for the bus, three meals on Saturday, breakfast on Sunday and all the rafting you can stand. All scouts, (puppies through seniors) and interested parents are welcome to go.

Full payment is due to the outfitter by July 22. If you want to go, money and the number of participants must be in by July 15th.
