Eagles Leave the Nest


Troop 19 would like to correct two of the recognitions from last newsletter. Two of our Eagles were graduating Seniors and have moved on to college.

My Trek at Philmont Scout Ranch

This summer I was given the opportunity to go to Philmont Scout Ranch, but before we got to Philmont we stopped at Colorado Springs for touring. We went to the U.S. Olympic Training Center, Royal Gorge Bridge which was 1,053 feet high, Air Force Academy, Whitewater Rafting on the Arkansas River, Garden of Gods which is a bunch of unusual shaped rocks that you could boulder on, and lastly the coolest thing was traveling to the top of Pikes Peak where the temperature was 42 degrees with winds blowing at 35 mph.

After all this exciting touring we took a 6 hour bus ride to Philmont. Once we arrived there we met our ranger Tim Cole of Louisiana. He only stayed with us 2 days so that we could get acquired to the environment and give us some safety tips. During the trip it rained mostly in the afternoon, and on one special afternoon my tent buddy and I were cooking dinner in the rain when a lighting bolt hit a tree 30 feet away from us. The tree began to catch on fire but the rain put it out. There was a distinctive line on the tree and a two foot deep hole where it hit the ground.

While hiking I met Mr.Webb who was the Scoutmaster of Troop 19 during the 1950's and 1960's, Mr.Webb moved from Huntersville to Dallas, Texas many years ago and he is planning on attaining the 50 year anniversary of Troop 19. We also met Lilly the Scoutmaster from the T.V. show Survivor; she had many fun stories to tell about the whole experience. We also took an 11 hour side hike to Baldy Mountain, which was 12.140 feet tall. the view was incredible.

In the mornings we would wake-up at 3:30, 4, or 4:30 A.M. to get a head start before the heat arrived.

The last day we did a
12-14 mile hike into
base camp, hiking over
the Tooth of Time. Seeing base camp was so
exciting, because you
knew that you had almost made it and it
pushed you 10 times
harder to get there. We
hiked a total of 86 miles.
This experience was so
incredible that I would
recommend it to ANYONE!!!

> Who Walks in the Forest.

The Vigil Honor is the highest honor that a lodge can give to an Arrowman. By nomination only, the honor is given by the Lodge to those Arrowmen who have shown outstanding and unselfish service to the lodge. To be nominated, an Arrowman must have at least 2 years as a Brotherhood member.

Where are They Now?!

As a prelude to the 2005 anniversary year, where Troop 19 will celebrate 50 years of continuous service and 67 years since our founding, we have added a new column. The new column will have short segments on notable Troop 19 members of the past including past Scoutmasters, Troop Committee members and Eagle Scouts.

This column we cover two special Troop 19 alumni, founding Scoutmaster E G "Bert" Kumm and our first Eagle Scout, William Brevard "Bill" Blythe, II.

Bert Kumm was a Canadian and a naturalized US Citizen. In 1926, Egbert Frederick Kumm came South from Eganville, Ontario, Canada to take a position with N & P Bakery Company in Charlotte. In 1938, with the assistance of Legette Blythe, Troop 19's first Troop Committee Chairman, Mr. Kumm established Troop 19.

Bert Kumm served as Scoutmaster of Troop 19 on three separate occasions. Starting with the founding of the Troop in 1938, Bert served from 1938 - 1948, 1950 - 52 and lastly, 1956 - 1960. During those years, his great love was his Boy Scouts, and proudly he saw six of them, all members of Huntersville Presbyterian Church, attain the highest rank in Scouting, Eagle Scout: Bill Blythe (1943), Tom Craven (1944), Council Dudley (1948), Bob Blythe (1952), Henry Miller Pigg (1952) and his son, Joe He attended the two-year program Frederick Kumm (1952). Bert Kumm was Troop 19's first Silver Beaver recipient, receiving the recognition in 1964. Mr. Kumm died in 1970 and is buried in the Huntersville Presbyterian Church Cemetery.

William Brevard Blythe II devoted more than half a century of his life to the University of North Carolina as a doctor, teacher and mentor.

His legacy is that he became a leader of a very strong division of nephrology (kidney disease) through his effectiveness as a

teacher and mentor. The secret of his success was that he inspired the people around him -- and he especially inspired young people."

A native of Huntersville, he graduated from high school at the age of 15. After one year at Oak Ridge Military Academy, he entered the University and graduated in 1948 at the age of 19.

at UNC Medical Schools, then completed his M.D. at Washington University in St. Louis in 1953.

He returned to the University as a member of the medical school fac-

ultv in 1961. He died Dec. 21, 2001 following a heart attack. He was

Eagle Scout Scholarships

Eagle Scouts who are graduating high school seniors or who will be attending an accredited college or university awarding at least a bachelor's degree may qualify for a scholarship through the National Eagle Scout Association.

Applicants for all scholarships must (1) have received the Eagle Scout Award prior to application submission, (2) have demonstrated leadership in Scouting, and (3) have a strong record of participation in activities outside of Scouting. Applicants must have a SAT and/or ACT score acceptable to the standards set by the review committee.

Available Scholarships include:

Cooke Scholarships - One Scholarship of \$48,000 (\$12,000 per year) and four \$20,000 (\$5,000 per year). Applicants must demonstrate financial need and have the endorsement of a volunteer or professional Scout leader who knows them personally.

Elks Foundation Scholarship - four scholarships of \$8000 (\$2,000 per year) and four \$4,000 (\$1,000 per year).
National Eagle Scout Scholarship Fund -

12 scholarships of \$3,000 (lump sum).

Hall - McElwain Scholarships - 80 Scholarships of \$1,500 annually (20 in each of BSA 4 regions). They are based on merit and are open to high school seniors through the undergraduate junior year in college.

Applications are available on the BSA website (www.scouting.org/nesa/scholar/appform.pdf) at local council service centers or from NESA.

Applications must be postmarked after Oct. 1 but no later than midnight on Jan 31 2005 and received NESA no later than Feb 5, 2005.
