




the start of the centennial celebrations of the founding of Scouting.

ers attending Wood Badge beginning this spring. Beginning in April, ASM David Ruggles, ASM Dave McDonnell, ASM Cliff Summers, ASM Jeff Nye and Cub Master Craig Orr will attend Wood Badge.

Wood Badge is a training course for Scouters which results as part of their award two small wooden beads on a leather thong. Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of Scouting, directed the first course in 1919 and gave each of the participants one of the beads which he had captured from the African chieftain Dinizulu. Thus did the course name develop, for its symbol was literally a badge of wood.

Troop 19 will have several lead- Wood Badge is Scouting's premier training course. Baden-Powell designed it so that Scouters could learn, in as practical a way possible, the skills and methods of Scouting. It is first and foremost, learning by doing. The members of the course are formed into patrols and these into a troop. The entire troop lives in the out-of-doors, camping, cooking their own meals, and practicing Scout skills.

> After the out of doors course work. each candidate prepares a ticket. A ticket is a contract between you and a member of the staff usually referred to as a Troop Guide or Counselor. This contract is your commitment to practice using the Leadership Skills taught at Wood Badge in



the performance of your Scouting job. A Ticket consists of four parts:

- A list of your personal values
- A description of your Scouting role or job
- A statement of your vision of success
- A mission composed of five significant goals that can be attained within 18 months.

Attention: Life Scouts!!

Please encourage your son to keep Eagle Candidate's application as climbing the trail to Eagle. It will change his future. That trail takes your son through an Eagle Leadership Service Project in addition to earning merit badges, the troop positions of responsibilities, and his many camping trips. The troop has an Eagle Mentor, Mr. Rich Hehn, to assist your son in completing the preparations for his Eagle Project.

Mr. Hehn volunteers his evenings during the week while he is at work in West Virginia and weekends as needed to communicate with the Eagle Candidates about their Eagle Project applications. When each Eagle Candidate has his application nearly completed, Mr. Hehn arranges for a committee of troop parents to meet and have the Eagle Candidate present his project.

The purpose is to have more parents than just Mr. Hehn review the well as to allow the Eagle Candidate to gain experience talking about his project to a group of adults, which is what he will have to do in his Eagle Board of Review.

The application must be approved by Council before the Eagle Candidate can proceed with his project. Council meets on the third Tuesday of each month, with no exceptions, to review the applications in hand. This can sometimes create a crunch for the troop project review committee when it necessary to hold a review before the third Tuesday so the application can be edited, if necessary, completed and signed for submission to Council.

When it is time to assemble a project review committee, the call goes out to adults in the troop. Mr. Hehn typically seeks voluntary help from

among the current group of Life Scout parents. This is to give the parents a preview of what their Eagle Candidate will be required to do and to encourage them to assist their Life Scout in every way they can. When the call comes to you, please make every effort to volun**teer.** There is no special training required. All it takes is being a parent. The reviews take from an hour to less than two hours and are usually done on a weekend day, although some Thursday and Friday nights work best for all involved.

and is one of the most respected positions for Academy cadets.

Scott is planning to attend The Citadel in the Fall of 2005 and plans to pursue a career in the military.
